

Resolution on Protecting Election Integrity from Foreign Influence and Partisan Nonprofit Abuse

Saluda County Republican Party

A Resolution Calling for Investigation, Oversight, and Legislative Reform Concerning Foreign-Funded and Partisan Nonprofit Election Activity

WHEREAS, credible reports have documented that certain nonprofit organizations, including Freedom2Vote operating in partnership with Civitech, are accepting foreign donations while using partisan data tools to target voter registration and mobilization efforts designed to influence the outcomes of U.S. elections in favor of Democratic candidates; and

WHEREAS, federal law prohibits foreign nationals from making contributions or expenditures in connection with any federal, state, or local election and requires organizations holding 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status to conduct all voter-related activities in a strictly nonpartisan manner without favoring or opposing any candidate or political party; and

WHEREAS, the exploitation of nonprofit tax status to shield foreign-funded, partisan voter operations undermines the integrity of our elections and erodes public trust in the democratic process; and

WHEREAS, the Saluda County Republican Party has an interest in ensuring that election laws are enforced uniformly and that nonprofit organizations engaged in election-related activity are fully accountable under federal law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Saluda County Republican Party calls upon:

1. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to immediately initiate comprehensive audits of Freedom2Vote, Power for Democracies, and all similar nonprofit organizations engaged in voter registration and mobilization to determine compliance with 501(c)(3) nonpartisanship requirements, and to revoke tax-exempt status in cases of violation.
2. The Federal Election Commission (FEC) to conduct a thorough investigation into the flow of foreign money into U.S. voter registration and get-out-the-vote efforts, including any potential violations of the Foreign Nationals Prohibition under federal election law.
3. The United States Congress to enact stronger legislation closing the nonprofit loophole by mandating full disclosure of all foreign donors to organizations involved in election-related activities, establishing clear prohibitions on partisan targeting and data use, and barring tax-exempt entities from using foreign funds in any voter mobilization work.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Saluda County Republican Party urges elected officials, candidates, and fellow Republican organizations to support these oversight and reform measures to safeguard the principle that only American citizens, not foreign interests or partisan nonprofits, should determine the outcomes of American elections.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon passage, the Secretary of the Saluda County Republican Party is directed to transmit copies of this Resolution to the persons and offices listed in Appendix A.
